We believe that all children deserve access to safe, affordable, high-quality child care. We believe in the value of the work of child care providers as they play a critical role in preparing our next generation for life. We believe in the partnership between child care providers and parents as they support the healthy development of children. We believe in the importance of investing in children by investing in child care. Below are our key public policy agenda items and related resources and partners.

# Affordability

Child Care Council believes in promoting affordable child care. Affordable means different things to different families. For some families, receiving a subsidy will make child care affordable. For other families, having access to tax credits will make child care affordable. Many families may have to make difficult career and family choices because of the cost of child care.

### **Parent Choice**

Child Care Council believes that only parents know what is best for their children. We believe in the value of informed choice about quality child care. Every family's needs are different; every child's needs are different. We believe in sharing information about all child care options, quality child care, safety, and cost, and supporting a parent's decision. We believe that, regardless of modality, all types of care have the potential to be high-quality. This is why we continue to advocate for Legally Exempt Child Care. Legally Exempt enrollment allows a family receiving a child care subsidy to choose an unregulated caregiver for their children. Parents know their family's needs best, and if that need is best met by a grandparent, or a cousin, or a neighbor, parents should be supported in that choice regardless of income.

### Safer Environments

Child Care Council believes in the importance of keeping children safe, both at home and in care. This is one of the reasons the Council has actively supported the Child Safe Products Act two years in a row. The CSPA passed the Assembly in 2013 but was not brought to the Senate floor for a vote in 2014, in spite of strong bi-partisan support.
